Lift up your hearts!

We lift them up to the Lord!

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

It is right to give God thanks and praise.

The Great Thanksgiving

God our Creator, we thank you for reaching out to call us, even when we are slow to answer. We give thanks for your great love, and for your presence in all that we do; for the gift of faith, growing within us, producing fruits according to your plan.

Most of all, however, we thank you for the life, the death and the resurrection of your Son, our Lord Jesus. We thank you that when we had fallen from our created perfection, you came to us in Jesus, living the life that we live, walking the roads that we walk, serving us faithfully. In perfect love and obedience, he took upon himself the unearned death of a criminal, dying for our sins. You stamped his sacrifice with triumph, raising him from death, setting him over the entire created universe. Now, when our strength to carry on grows faint He is there; willingly bearing burdens too great for us; in him our faith and our worship find their perfect object, and by His grace our lives are recreated. Therefore, we join with joy the ancient chorus:

Holy, Holy, Holy Lord, God of power and might Heaven and earth are full of your glory, Hosanna in the highest! Blessed is he, who comes in the name of the Lord, Hosanna in the highest, Hosanna to the Lord!

The Commemoration

On the night in which our Lord was betrayed, he sat at the table with his friends. Breaking bread, he said: "Take and eat. This is my body which is broken for you. As often as you share it together, do it in remembrance of me."

When the meal was finished, he poured a cup, blessed it and said: "Drink this all of you. This is my blood which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sin. As often as you share it, do so in remembrance of me."

The Consecration

Bless now these gifts of bread and wine, elements chosen from our common life. Pour out your Holy Spirit upon them, and upon us removing them from all common and ordinary use, letting them be, when received in faith, the body and blood of Christ, food for the journey on which he is both guide and

goal. By that same Spirit, fill our minds and hearts with desire to offer our lives in service to you. Amen.

Thus we proclaim the core of our faith: Christ has died; Christ is risen; Christ will come again. These are the gifts of God. Receive them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

The Communion

We invite to the Table all who recognize Christ as Lord, regardless of denominational affiliation or lack thereof. Today we will receive the elements seated in our pews. Please wait until each element is distributed. We will consume the bread and the cup together. It is our custom to offer the cup as follows: the outer ring of cups is wine, while the inner rings are grape juice. Please keep silence until the prayer.

The Post-Communion Thanksgiving

Eternal God, we thank you for this simple meal. Let our sharing at this table be to the strengthening of our spirits, minds and bodies and lead us forth, renewed in faith to serve the world, through Jesus Christ: our Lord, our Savior and our Brother. Amen.

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<u>A Note About Today's First Hymn</u>, '*He Lives*' was written in 1932 by a Presbyterian minister, Alfred Ackley. Although he is best known for his contributions to church music, he was also a pastor. The hymn was written following a revival where a Jewish man questioned why he should believe, and then by a published sermon where a pastor, more or less dismissed, the reality and our need for the resurrected Christ. Some theologians have been concerned, over time, that the message of the hymn is focused on personal experience and not solely on Scripture.

We have talked at length about how our witness of Christ needs to be of Him in our lives – 'how have we experienced Him?". That does not detract from the Scriptural basis (which Ackley drew from Mark's account of the Resurrection) or our reliance on Scripture as our authority ("Scripture Alone"). Just as we discussed last week concerning Philip and the Ethiopian, Philip relied on an explanation - a teaching - of the Scriptures to convey the Gospel to the Ethiopian. Yet, throughout the New Testament we frequently see references to the personal experience of those who testified – be it Paul or any of the original group of disciples that we read about in the Acts. It is not a question of Scriptural basis or experience – our testimony is from both – the texts that we read and the experience we have of God in our lives.
